

ANALYSIS OF FELLOWSHIP QUESTIONNAIRES 2024

Questionnaires were sent to fellows who had completed their fellowship between March 2023 and March 2024.

- 12 out of the 13 fellows were employed, one was not employed;
- All 12 fellows who were employeed held permanent positions;
- 11 fellows remained in the UK after their fellowship and one moved to Europe; eight had remained at the research organisation where they held their fellowship, four took up positions at a different research organisation and one fellow did not continue in their research area;
- 12 with permanent positions, fell within the remit of STFC science;
- the fellows defined their occupation as:
 - o academic lecturer (4);
 - o academic research and lecturer (8);
 - o other (1);
- the gross annual salary of those employed was between £40,000 and £55,000+;
- 12 fellows stated the fellowship was essential or very helpful in order to obtain their current position, one fellow noted that is was of no use/not required;
- the main factors influencing fellows into accepting their position was the opportunity to pursue original research in the same field, followed by the opportunity to work in a stimulating and challenging area. The factor that least influenced fellows into accepting their position was the opportunity to work outside the UK.

The fellowship questionnaire includes a section on mentoring. UK Research and Innovation has published a <u>Statement of Expectations for Research Fellowships and Future Research Leaders</u> which includes the expectations of research organisations. In line with these expectations, the fellows were asked what provision was given by their research organisation:

62% received guidance and training on setting up a research group;

54% received guidance and training on building partnerships & collaborations;

69% received guidance on public engagement:

85% received access to career development support and advice;

69% received support for any proposed leadership activities.

AGGREGATE DATA

The total number of questionnaires received between 2015 and 2024 was:

Since 2015, 96% of fellows who were employed had secured a permanent contract after their fellowship had ended (Figures 1 & 2).




In the last 10 years 95% of fellows remained in the UK after their fellowship had ended. (Figures 3 & 4)




It is evident that since 2015 over 91% of fellows each year found that their fellowship was essential or very helpful in order to obtain their current position. (Figures 5 & 6)




Employment

- all fellows had defined their occupation as an academic lecturer or both an academic researcher and lecturer;
- all fellows except for one in 2015 and one in 2024 had remained in HEIs or research institutes;
- 98% of fellows had employment that fell within the STFC remit.

Key findings of aggregate data:

- Since 2015 all fellows apart from two were employed.
- 96% of fellows that were employed held permanent jobs after they had completed their fellowship;
- 99% of fellows stayed in academia after their fellowship had ended.
